- **MEW DOCUMENT PRINT SERVICE.** Library staff will print your short "computer print" jobs (shipping labels, applications, resumes, etc.) if you email them to <u>help@freeholdpubliclibrary.org</u>. Cost for printing is 20¢ per page. Documents must be picked up within three business days or they will be destroyed. The library reserves the right to decline lengthy print jobs or prints that are not "print ready" (require additional formatting or incompatible file types), or from patrons who have not picked up prior prints. Patrons needing to use library computers to format material to print must make a computer use appointment. Please contact the library for details.

Groundhog Day is February 2. It's also the title of a 1993 movie starring Bill Murray. In the movie, Murray's character, a crotchety television weather personality, finds himself reluctantly in Punxsutawney, Pennsylvania for annual ritual of, well Groundhog Day.

The Genuine Article

Which is better? Library of Congress Classification or Dewey Decimal System?



get out of this. All of this.

The answer is: whatever one is used wherever you are!

Dewey Decimal Classification (DDC), or "system" as many call it, was invented in 1876 by Melvil Dewey, an American librarian responsible for many quintessential library practices. Dewey was attempting to "organize all knowledge." In DDC, there are ten large groupings (science, literature, and religion, to name a few) assigned a "hundreds" number (literature being 800s, for example). Those large groupings are further divided (poetry is 811). And the divisions continue according to the "rules" of DDC. Because this scheme has been around so long and adopted by so many libraries, it is recognizable and comfortable for many people to use. Using DDC, the "call numbers" on the spines of books follow a sequence just like the mathematical number line, so when someone has that "call number" in hand, they can theoretically walk to a shelf, go left or right and find the item they want. DDC is used at Freehold Public Library.

The Library of Congress Classification (LCC) was developed at the turn of the 20th Century to better organize material belonging to—you guessed it—the United States Library of Congress. It looks more complicated, as it involves letters and numbers, and different rows of letters and numbers. The material is organized to suit the specific needs of that enormous collection (over 170 *million* items) and physical arrangement of the Library of Congress. Keep in mind that this collection is housed in at least three different buildings. Many large libraries, especially in academic settings (university level), have adopted the LCC scheme for their own use. (It can be a bit of a shock for students accustomed to DDC in their high schools or community libraries to suddenly search for items on LCC shelves. Librarians are there to help!)

Regardless of a library's collection or lay-out, the need is always the same: to organize, describe and make findable the material and information they curate.
