Dear Library Patron

Banned Books Week is coming around again. So are attempts to ban books.

Never in my experience has your freedom to access material and information of your own choosing been under this degree of threat.

I try to resist sounding like an alarmist, but the lack of tolerance for diversity of viewpoints and ideas that is exhibited by a **loud minority** in this nation is deeply troubling. It is one thing for someone to say *I don't like this book* (that's their right). But when one **represses or interferes with the intellectual liberty of another**, that is crossing a line. It's a tactic straight out of some of the best classic "banned books" including Orwell's *Nineteen Eighty-Four*, Atwood's *The Handmaid's Tale*, and Bradbury's *Fahrenheit 451*.

What can you do?

Read up.

- Make an effort to learn about and understand varying issues surrounding "book bans."
- See what the fuss is about. Read contemporary challenged material for yourself.
- **Dig deeper into taglines/headlines**; don't simply absorb attention-grabbing tactics such as calling credible children's literature porn; decrying an elementary school's social studies program as "CRT" (which isn't even a "thing" at that level of education); or claiming depiction of non-traditional families is threatening someone's religious beliefs.
- Reacquaint yourself with the United States Constitution and Bill of Rights

Show up.

- Attend gatherings or meetings where these hostile attacks against intellectual freedom are launched. • Fortunately, Freehold Borough has been spared these assaults for the most part, but "out of towners" have been known to agitate in other communities. If you're already knowledgeable and involved, you'll be well-positioned to bear witness to the value of free and unfettered access to content, information and material.
- "Vote with your feet" by using your library's resources as these institutions are fundamentally working to ensure • your freedoms, and your engagement supports that mission.
- Be present and supportive of professionals such as educators, journalists, politicians, librarians/library staff and many others who are leading the charge to protect your freedom. This includes many student activists.

Speak up.

- Respond confidently, immediately and firmly to anyone who would suggest suppressing the choices of others is in everyone's (or anyone's) best interest be it in person, in the press, or on social media platforms.
- Ask challengers: Have you read it? (Most complainers haven't even seen, held or read a book they think shouldn't be available.)
- It's perhaps easier to let slide the idle remark by a friend or associate, but others may be more likely to listen and consider ideas expressed by familiars and friends. Invest energy in discussing the topic with them.
- Proactively discuss how important guality information, fact-based decision-making, and access to diverse and intellectually stimulating material is to a free society.

Banning books (and otherwise restricting access to the "marketplace of ideas") is wrong, dangerous, and decidedly un-American.

Be well: be well informed.
