
NEWS & UPDATES

Dear Library Patron

As we enter a time of warmer temperatures, let's discuss the chilling effect.

Generally, the *chilling effect* is negative social or cultural pressure which suppresses your ability to exercise or access your rights to have, do, assert, learn, express or create.

This goes beyond "peer pressure." The chilling effect is more subtle and has a broader influence. It's a vaguely-felt force which deters people from exercising their fundamental Constitutional rights; squelches leaders' confidence to do their best work in and for communities; suppresses creativity, innovation, imagination and expression; and discourages an individual's participation in any number of democratic processes.

- A school media specialist hesitates to replace a worn-out copy of a book because someone in administration will make a fuss (even if nobody explicitly instructed them to remove that book).
- A public librarian quietly places a book behind the circulation desk desk after a patron called it "filthy" (keeping it out of sight to avoid uncomfortable confrontation)
- A teacher hurries through a history lesson in the school's textbook in anticipation a parent will complain
 the subject made their child uncomfortable (even though the subject is required for that grade's
 curriculum)
- A customer doesn't browse a entire section of a local bookstore because they don't want to risk being seen anyway near *certain types* of books (and the customer wants to avoid people jumping to conclusions)
- A parent who needs help explaining the human reproductive system to their child resists borrowing a book because it appeared as a "bad" book on some social media influencer's video (and another parent they know will surely have something to say about it)
- A talented potential teacher or librarian chooses another profession after observing people in the field being harassed and abused (and calculates they may avoid that hassle by preparing for a different career)
- A person hesitates to publish an honest memoir after witnessing a different writer's family being attacked on social media (and another important story goes untold)
- An artist doesn't create a masterpiece, and doesn't engage in the many artistic expressions on the way
 to that achievement, because someone will be offended and may act to ruin that artist's prospects or
 opportunities (and our world becomes increasingly duller)

The chilling effect feels less alarming than book burnings. But every book burning starts with a tiny flame.
