



Dear Library Patron:

Even if you never read ebooks (or use other digital content such as downloadable audiobooks), you might have heard about the struggle between libraries and publishers about how to deliver such content to library users.

While it might seem like ebooks, which "live on the Internet," should be easy for someone to obtain and share, that's not the case with ebooks for libraries.

When a library buys a "paper" book, it's the library's to keep and share forever (or at least until it falls apart, doesn't get returned, or is removed from the collection to make room for new books). There are fair-use rules that have been "on the books" for a long time to govern and ensure library users' access to such materials.

With ebooks, it's a very different story. There are complicated rules set by publishers, and they vary greatly. Long-story-short, when a library buys an *ebook*, we're only buying a *license* to access (or lend-out) that content. At some point, that ebook is going to simply disappear into the ether. The rules about when those digital items disintegrate are all over the place, but it's not unusual to see terms such as "26 loans," or "two years (no matter how many times a title is borrowed)." Newer ebooks typically cost upwards of \$60.00 each for one-at-a-time-borrowing (with downloadable audiobooks around \$90), but, again, the range is wide.

The ebook publishers are in business to make money. Everybody "gets" that. But their assertion that their ebook policy is modeled on the durability of paper library book doesn't hold water. Hardback books certainly outlive two years or 26 loans. As an example, I just randomly checked one hardback

title we acquired in October 2018. It's up to 31 loans and still in going strong.

One of the major publishing houses (Macmillan), in an effort to drive sales, is experimenting with placing a "library embargo" on several new ebook titles by popular authors. They hope impatient readers will buy the content, rather than wait-out the delay forced on libraries. As a result, front-line library staff are "taking the heat." Patrons see the "release date" of an anticipated title pass by, often with the content disintegrating from the library's catalog before all but a few lucky users have a shot at it.

Freehold Public Library subscribes to the ebook/e-audiobook service expertly managed by eLibraryNJ. This consortium serves libraries large and small in New Jersey. The librarians there tend the collection, order material, keep-track of when popular digital titles need to be "repurchased" from publishers, and generally work super-hard to meet the needs of the borrowing public and keep-up with the moving target that is ebook publishing. These librarians, along with other consortia, library systems, and professional and advocacy associations such as the American Library Association, continue to strive for your ability to access the material you want.

This is just another challenge libraries face as we defend your right to enjoy all sorts of quality information and entertainment, and try our best to make it available to you.


